

QUOTES FROM INDIVIDUAL CHAMPIONS

118 POUNDS - JODY STRITTMATTER - PITTSBURGH-JOHNSTOWN

"Its just been an unbelievable season. I've gone the entire season witthout being injured and I really have to thank my family and my coaches for helping me to get to this point. This is really a great finish to a great season.

"When I was down 6-1 in the semi finals I might have given up, but I looked over at my coaches and they made me dig down and believe that I could win and I did. They have had that kind of confidence in me all season long and it really helped in this tournament.

"The (championship) match didn't really go the way I expected, I knew that he (Damon Broadbent) likes to get out early and when I got the first two takedowns I knew I could dominate. He was a very tough opponent, and I really had to work to win the match."

126 POUNDS - MATT GOODSON - CENTRAL OKLAHOMA

"I was glad I wrestled well tonight, I think I struggled a little bit yesterday in the first two rounds but I had a lot more confidence tonight and I think that showed.

"Beating Craig Otto in the semi finals was a really big win for me because I think he is a very good wrestler. That win really gave me a lot of confidence coming into tonights match.

"Since this was my third time at the Championships I just wanted to come in here and wrestle smart and not get caught in anything stupid. I had to be careful not to be to conservative, but I didn't want to make any mistakes. I just wanted to wrestle on my feet as much as possible and I was able to do that for the most parth throughout the tournament.

"Being seeded number two in this tournament really provided extra motivation for me. I would have liked to meet (#1 seed) Troy Keiswetter in the finals but it didn't work out. I'm just happy with the win."

134 POUNDS - BRAUMAN CREIGHTON - NEBRASKA-OMAHA

"That was probably the toughest match I've ever wrestled. I had great confidence coming in and I really thought I would be able to dominate a little bit more than I did. He (Isaac Greeley) just kept coming at me and he was a lot stronger than I expected.

"The match really didn't go the way I exptected it to. I thought I would get the first takedown and I didn't and I really thought I would be able to ride him better than I did.

"I thought I caught a break when Greeley beat (#1 seed George) Thompson in the semi finals, but as it turns out, this was probably the tougher match. He gave me more than I expected.

"I just really have to thank my coaches and my family. This makes all the sacrafices worth it."

142 POUNDS - TROY SZYDEL - MANKATO STATE

"That was a tough way to win the championship, I really wish we could have wrestled the entire match. Even though I was behind, I think I could have come back to win.

"The crowd was really tough. Wrestling him in front of his home crowd had to give him a lot of confidence and he came out very strong. He didn't really surprise me, I know what he is capable of, he's a very good wrestler.

"I didn't know how our previous match would affect this one, but Chris came out very strong. Beating him down here a couple of weeks ago added extra motivation for him I'm sure.

"Even though I won, I wish it wouldn't have ended the way it did. I guess I'll just have to hope that I can meet him in the finals again next year and we can wrestle the full seven minutes."

150 POUNDS-TRAVIS KING - SOUTH DAKOTA STATE

"What a great way to end my wrestling career, I couldn't have asked for anything better this entire season. This is just a great way to cap off the season.

"After not making the finals last year and watching the championship from the stands, I committed myself to this year. I really worked hard in the off-season and this is the payoff for all the hard work. This is what I put in all those extra hours for.

"I wrestled (Jody) Marple once earlier in the season and won 3-1 so I knew that I could beat him, but I didn't expect to beat him by the score I did tonight. He is a tough wrestler, and gave me a tough match.

"I really felt comfortable the last half of the season, after winning my third conference championship I just wanted to come in here and wrestle relaxed and I knew I would be fine."

158 POUNDS - MARK PAZDERNIK - NORTH DAKOTA STATE

"Winning this along with the team title makes this year a great finish to my career. Four years ago we had a great recruiting class and we had looked forward to our senior year. My individual title is only part of the whole picture, the team title really makes this a great finish.

"I knew it was going to be a long, tough road to the championship. Being the number six seed I knew that I would have to go through two of the toughest wrestlers here to win it. I thought coming in that I would have to wrestle up to my best ability to win the whole thing and that's what I did. I took one match at a time and it all worked out.

"I think I had a mental edge coming into the championship match because I had beat him (Justin Edwards) for seventh place last year. I don't know if that played a factor in anything, but I think it helped me."

167 POUNDS - STEVE SAXLUND - NORTH DAKOTA STATE

"We came in as a team with the goal in mind of winning the team title and everything else was just an extra. I'm really excited for the coaches and all my teammates, everthing really seemed to fall into place for us this year.

"We all wrestled with a lot of heart, and I knew that if I could come out and wrestle up to my abiltiy everything would take care of itself. He (Myron Ellegood) was my toughest opponent of the tournament, but I felt better in this match than I have all tournament so it all worked out.

"I got really tired toward the end of the match, but I knew that he was tired too, so it became a test of wills. I just knew that I had to hang on, but it was tough.

"I knew that I was better on my feet, so that was my game plan coming in. I didn't want to get into a situation where he could ride me and I was able to stay out of that."

177 POUNDS - JOHN SIMPSON - COLORADO MINES

"Having been here last year I kind of knew what to expect and I think that helped me prepare. When you come here you know every match is going to be a fight and that's exactly what it was.

"I thought I could win if I took every match one at a time." My first match was one of the toughest, and from that point on I knew that I would have to be at my best every time I took the mat.

"He (Jeremie Ott) was a real pounder and tried to be real physical with me and get me out of my style. I knew that I had to just be patient and stay in control and take my shot when it was open. I was able to maintain my style and it paid off.

"Having this tournament in Pueblo was really great for me. I couldn't have had a much better scenario than winning in my home state where my family and friends were able to see me. It was really nice to be in a familiar environment and I'm just glad it worked out the way it did.

190 POUNDS - LINK STEFFEN - SOUTHWEST STATE

"I came into this tournament to win it all and that's what I did. I would have been disappointed with anything less than a national championship.

"Coming into the tournament undefeated might have had people shooting for me, but I was ready. Even though I was the number four seed, that didn't matter to me. When you get to this point in the season everything that has happened previously is history and you have to come into each match to win.

"This is what I've always dreamed of and it's still a numb feeling. When you put in that much work for something like this and then it happens you don't quite know how to react. It hasn't set in yet that I'm the national champion.

"I had been beaten by some of the guys here in past years, but I knew that I could wrestle with any of them, so that provided incentive to show my ability.

"This is just a great way to finish my perfect season."

HWT - RYAN RESEL - SOUTH DAKOTA STATE

"Up until the finals I thought everyting went as I expected it would. I just wanted to wreslte solid and get into the finals because I knew that once you get into the finals anything can happen.

"I knew it would probably be a one or two point match and that's exacty how it ended up. I wanted to be the one who initiated the action and get a takedown because I knew that if I got a takedown I would have the advantage down the stretch.

"When I got the takedown in the third period I felt like all I had to do was hang on and ride him. It was everything I expected and more.

"I knew that it would take a lot of work in the off season to repeat as champion and from the minute I stepped off the mat last year I started preparing for this year. My preparation is what got me to this point and that's what I intend to do again this year, I start preparing for next year tomorrow.

"The second one is just as sweet if not sweeter than the first one."

The 1997-98 NCAA II All-Academic Wrestling Team consists of 71 student-athletes from twenty seven universities and colleges. Twenty five members were named to the first team, twenty to the second team, and twenty six were named as honorable mention. The University of Pittsburgh at Johnstown placed five members on the first and second teams and Central Missouri State University placed four members.

Named for the second time were Brad Keiffer from Truman State; Matt Surber from Central Oklahoma; Jason Brilz from Nebraska-Omaha; Jaison Klingensmith from Pitt-Johnstown; Ryan Marz from St. Cloud State; Wayne Mooney from North Dakota State; Travis Shives from Mankato State; John Simpson from Colorado Mines; Ryan Thorpe from Nothern State; Joseph Veres III from Ashland University; Chad Wickman from South Dakota State; Brian Friedrichs from Minnesota-Morris; Ryan Holgate from Colorado Mines; Jonathan Nichols from San Francisco State; Mike Ross from Colorado School of Mines; Brandon Terry from Nebraska-Kearney; Scott Wence from Truman State and Robert Sistek from Northern Colorado. The highest grade point average on the team was a 4.00 earned by Robert Sistek, an Accounting major from the University of Northern Colorado.

In order for a student-athlete to be nominated to the NCAA Division II All-Academic Wrestling team, he needed to have a minimum 3.00 cumulative grade point average on a 4.0 scale. He must also be in at least his second full year at his school, be a varsity member on his team, demonstrate a degree of skill, and have a minimum of two letters of recommendation (academic advisor and coach) submitted on his behalf.

Other winners have been Truman State University and the Colorado School of Mines recorded the highest team grade point average (GPA) in the fifth annual NCAA Division II All-Academic Wrestling Team selection and won the Academic National Wrestling Championship. This is the third University of Wisconsin-Parkside. Their team grade point average of 3.319 topped the 3.296 recorded by Colorado School of Mines in 1995-96. The team grade point average is calculated by averaging the cumulative grade point average of ten wrestlers from each team of which eight of those wrestlers must have completed in their team's NCAA II National qualifying tournament.
